We made the move from St. John's to Grand Falls-Windsor, allowing us to be more connected to our rural goals. We saw the switch of Executive Directors, we wished Cyril all the best and welcomed Sherri. We also welcomed Samantha as our Outreach Coordinator.

This year has been a fresh start - a reset and refocus. The running theme of almost every conversation was connection; re-establishing our Network Newsletter and monthly Housing Support Worker meetings, reconnecting with our CABs and developing new connections with other community organizations.

We started by making trips out to visit CABs and meeting with the members to find out what's happening in their communities and what they want to accomplish. We also took this opportunity to have a new Strategic Plan created to help guide our decisions and actions in the future!

One of our goals is to become a centralized point of connection & information sharing. To action this goal we started developing profiles for the CABs, created digital tracking forms for Housing Support Workers and are actively facilitating various training opportunities and networking sessions that are relevant to Frontline Workers and organizations within the Network.

As you would've seen in the last newsletter, we were fortunate enough to attend the Making the Shift: Prevention of Youth Homelessness International Conference in Toronto this past February. This was an opportunity to learn about youth homelessness prevention structures and network with industry leaders. Taking opportunities to learn about partnerships and programs and allowing us to pass along these tools and help communities tailor them to their specific needs, contributes to NLHHN being the centralized point of connect for rural and remote NL.

We have so many plans for the next year that we can't wait to bring to life. If there's ever an opportunity for collaboration, especially in the ever changing political and economical climates we are all facing, now is the time to connect with NLHHN. We are always open to chat and see what kind of roll we can play!

Highlight of the Month

Showcasing our Network Members and their contributions

The Regional Action Committee on Housing (REACH) -Clarenville, NL



The Regional Action Committee on Housing (REACH) is a non-profit, communitybased organization covering Clarenville-Bonavista region that aims to provide housing, emotional and social supports to individuals who experience barriers to accessing mainstream services, including: people experiencing homelessness or precarious housing, people escaping intimate partner violence, people living with a variety of mental health complexities, people who use substances, people recently released from incarceration, and people living in poverty.

REACH has two separate support services in the Clarenville area: the REACH Hub and the REACH House.

- The **REACH Hub** is a wrap-around care support service that includes, housing support worker services and community outreach, weekly warm meals, drop-in safe space, personal laundry support, gently used clothing (Kelsey's Closet), the distribution of harm reduction supplies and resources, personal and housing items, Crest Bus food bank transportation and activities intended to facilitate physical / mental wellbeing through our *Wellness Wednesday's*.

- The **REACH House** is a emergency housing unit, consisting of three bedrooms (up to 6 guests), and shared kitchen, bathroom and living room area. Individuals living within the REACH House are provided with support by our Shelter Support Worker and receive regular check-ins. With the assistance of the Shelter Support Worker, we endeavor to help individuals gain independence and develop life skills that will contribute to their future tenancy.

The REACH Hub and REACH House are governed by a volunteer board of directors, consisting of a variety of community partners in the Clarenville area. Our board members and staffed Housing Support Worker and Shelter Support Worker are dedicated to improving the overall health and well-being of our service participants through a housing-first and harm reduction approach to care. As many of the individuals accessing support through REACH are living within complex situations, we endeavor to provide support that prioritizes our participants autonomy, while providing system navigation support including referral to additional wrap-around care supports.

The guiding Principles of REACH include:

- Housing-First Approach
- Harm Reduction Approach
- Advocacy for Safe & Affordable Housing
- Program Participants are Reflected in our Services
- Everyone Deserves Love, Compassion and Kindness
- Respect, Dignity & Autonomy



Our Housing Support Worker provide system navigation and support for many complex situations on a regular basis, including but not limited to:

- Emotional support:
 - Suicide, depression, stress, substance-related challenges, poverty, food insecurity etc.
- Support obtaining personal documents (i.e. Photo ID, Birth Certificate, SIN etc.)
- Support accessing detox and treatment services.
- Assisting with income support applications and navigating issues with CSSD Case Workers
- Supporting employed program participants in submitting their mail back forms to income support.
- Supporting individuals to submit medical transportation documents.
- Newfoundland & Labrador Housing Applications
- Canadian Housing Benefit Applications and Inspections
- Assisting with Mental Health & Addiction subsidies available through NL Health Services
- Supporting program participants navigate community resources and programs.
- Providing referrals to community partners, as needed
- Supporting participants with landlord / tenant issues and mediation
- Eviction prevention by maintaining connection with individuals and landlords engaged in our services, past and present.
- Assisting with transportation to appointments, foodbanks, apartment viewings, pharmacies etc to present participants
- Shelter diversion and Shelter Navigation
- Furniture search and collection for program participants

Here is an Overview of Supports that the REACH Hub offers:

Kelsey's Closet
•Named after one of our loved program participants, Kelsey Ellis who died suddenly in 2023, Kelsey's Closet provides access to previously enjoyed clothing items, completely free of charge. Folx in need are welcome to browse the closet and select as many items as needed.
Laundry Services
•A washer and dryer are available on-site that is free for anyone in need. Laundry detergent also provided.
Full Friday Meal
•In response to food insecurity, we prepare and serve a free warm meal every Friday between 12:00PM-1:30PM. Meals are often sponsored by community organizations, but are also provided by REACH.
Harm Reduction Corner
•Safe Injection / Inhalation Supplies, Naloxone, Fentanyl / Benzodiazipine Test Strips, Condoms, Pregnancy Tests, HIV Self-Test Kits, Harm Reduction Resources on Hepaitits C / HIV Prevention, Treatment and Care.
Outreach Office
•Available to all community partners. Well utilized by the Rural Initiative Outreach Team (RIOT); CSSD; NL Health Services etc.
Wellness Wednesdays
•Actitivies intended to foster positive connection and support to peers and community through art, music, hiking etc.
Drop-in Space
• This is a place that our participants can come to hangout, watch TV, have some snacks & refreshments and connect with informal support.
Library
•Books are available to anyone, free of charge!
Household Item Donations
•We accept gently used household items (i.e. toasters, kettles, dishes etc.). These items very are helpful for setting up accomodations when individuals are moving into new rentals etc.
